Joseph Guyer is a recent cancer survivor who has no home and is currently couch surfing with a friend in West Valley. Joseph had a bike he used to travel to the Huntsman Cancer Center for cancer treatments and for general transportation, until it was stolen last month. He had no money for a new bike and was devastated to be without transportation to get to his health appointments. Another blow occurred when social security discontinued disability payments that he was receiving for his cancer. Luckily, Fourth Street Clinic was able to help Joseph re-enroll in social security disability, has provided him with a bike through our Bike Collection Program with Fishers, and is currently working on finding housing for Joseph through county and city supportive housing units. Joseph is on his way to full recovery and will hopefully have a home to call his own soon. He is elated to have two new wheels for transportation, and is excited about having his health back so that he can find a job and start working once again.
